REFLECTION

At Reynella South we are a restorative practices school, which means that we view behaviour through a relationship lens. This means if a student does something that is not in-line with the student code of behaviour they will have a restorative chat with a member of staff.

During this chat the staff member will ask questions like the ones you can see on the red card and may talk about A and B choices. Students receive reflection because sometimes staff are unable to have this chat when the incident has occurred and so they have the chat with leadership at lunch time. Students may also attend reflection so that they can do the action to make things right. This may mean writing a letter of apology or doing an activity to repair the


harm done to their relationships with others because of their behaviour.

Reflection is not a punishment for children. It is an opportunity for students to work with staff to learn about the impact of their behaviour and how they can do things differently next time to get a better outcome. 
